Child Abuse Prevention Information

According to U.S. government sources, in 2007 over 1,700 children died as a result of abuse or neglect – more than four children every day. Over 75% were under 4 years of age and in almost 70% of these cases, one or both parents were involved. In addition, 794,000 children were victims of maltreatment or neglect – or more than 1% of all children in the U.S. Unfortunately, many believe these figures are low due to under-reporting and varying definitions of abuse.

We resolve to:

- Talk often about God's love and care for children. Be clear that the church also cares for children and does not support any abuse or violence.
- Develop a child-protection policy in our congregation and observe it carefully.
- Provide parenting classes, support groups, and friendship for parents in our congregation and community.
- Be familiar with and support Child Protective Services in our community. Invite them to provide us with information.
- Observe Child Abuse Prevention month on a regular basis (April).
